HOW CAN YOU HELP?

 Report baboon incidents in order to inform future management actions



KEEP BABOONS OFF YOUR PROPERTY

ALWAYS:

- Avoid planting exotic plants which bear fruit such as figs and nuts as baboons will keep returning to eat seasonal fruit.
- Keep doors locked and windows closed when baboons are in the vicinity.
- Install night bolts into sliding doors.
- Ensure that windows, particularly top-hung ones, have a latch at each end of the opening edge to prevent baboons from pulling the frame and breaking the glass.
- Install burglar bars with gaps smaller than 8 cm, including sides and tops of bars on windows you usually keep open.

SAFEGUARD YOUR BIN

- Fit a baboon proof locking device to your bin and keep your bin locked 24/7. Overstrand Municipality Enquiries can be contacted with regards to animal proof bins.
- Never leave refuse bags anywhere on pavements, even on refuse day.
- If you are away on refuse day, drop your refuse off at a refuse depot or ask your neighbour to share their bin, and return the favour another time.
- Only put refuse out before 07:30 am of the day of collection, not the day before.
- Advise and educate new residents in the area on the use of animal proof bins.

🗙 NEVER:

- Feed baboons they will return to your property again and again.
- Leave any food or seeds on display where they can be seen.
- Plant fruit trees, vegetable gardens or make compost heaps unless they are in a locked caged area or surrounded by electric fencing.





LAWS PROTECTING BABOONS

Baboons are protected under the Nature Conservation Ordinance 19 of 1974. It is illegal to feed or hunt baboons without a permit.

Anyone caught feeding baboons could face a year's imprisonment, a fine of up to R2 500, or both. Shooting at baboons with paintball guns or any other weapon without a permit could result in two year's imprisonment, a fine of up to R2 500, or both.

What happens to raiding baboons?

Sadly, it is very difficult to manage baboons habituated to suburbia, as once they associate easy access to human foods with your property, they will return over and over again. Authorities therefore have no choice but to apply the approved Baboon Management Guidelines in areas where baboons constantly raid, for the protection of the baboons and affected community.
