February 2022

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INTRODUCTION

This monthly report covers the period from 1 to 28 February 2022.

The Voëlklip Troop did not enter the urban area on a single occasion this month. Individual baboons only managed to access the urban space on two occasions. The troop continued to spend the majority if its time foraging on natural vegetation in the Fernkloof Nature Reserve and on the neighbouring farms.

The Vogelgat, Onrus and Hamilton Russell Troops and their individuals all remained out of town for the whole of February.

During February, the Pringle Bay Troop used the north western extent of their range intensively, with foraging behaviour focussed primarily on the riverine vegetation of the Rooiels River. The river palmiet (*Prionium serratum*) comprised a large proportion of their forage during this period, as well as the fruit and leaves of several species of trees found in the patches of Afrotemperate forest adjacent to the river. Several individuals were also observed eating the inflorescences of Red Reedpipe (*Tritoniopsis triticea*). The troop did not enter the urban area once over February, however PBM2 continued to move between the troop and the urban area, making three separate trips over the month. During his time in Pringle Bay PBM2 associated with HKM1, who spent the majority of the month in the urban area as he has been unable to integrate fully into the Pringle Bay Troop.

The Hangklip Troop continued to remain outside of the urban area, foraging in the Hangklip conservancy and Brodie Link reserve, whilst the Silversands Troop recorded one very brief incursion into the urban edge (23 minutes) during February.

Although the number of house incursions for the Betty's Bay Troop decreased this month, the troop still engaged in 138 incursions. This was almost double the number of incursions of the Pringle Bay Troop. Together these two troops engaged in 88.5% of all incursions recorded by all the Overstrand Troops this month. Apart from total incursions, the most notable difference between these two troops, was that in the Betty's Bay Troop the assertive incursions were recorded widely across the troop, whereas in the Pringle Bay Troop 90% of assertive incursions were recorded by one individual, the young sub-adult male, PBM2.

OVERSTRAND EAST TROOPS

1.1 VOËLKLIP TROOP

1.1.1 IN TOWN STATISTICS

- Troop time out of town remained at 100% this month.
- Time out of town for individuals increased from 98.2% in January to 99.7% in February.




Figure 2.1: Troop and individual daily (bars) and monthly (area) Time in Town by the Voëlklip Troop during February 2022.

1.1.2 NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

1.1.2.1 HERMANUS HEIGHTS & GOLF COURSE

• On 08 February multiple individuals entered town along Selkirk Street. An occupied house incursion was reported on Selkirk Street. A resident also reported an additional occupied house incursion on Waboom Street and HWS staff noticed that the bin outside the property was also raided.

• On 08 February, while some baboons were in town, HWS staff heard a paintball marker being discharged in Waboom Street. Neither the person discharging the marker nor the property from where it was discharged could be identified.

1.1.2.2 VOËLKLIP & FERNKLOOF

• No bin raids or house incursions were reported in Voëlklip this month.

1.1.2.3 <u>GENERAL</u>

- On 07 February, VGM1 was seen with the Voëlklip Troop again after disappearing on 24 January. He was subsequently not observed with the troop for next 13 days.
- During the afternoon of 10 February, the troop split into two subgroups, each subgroup contained one of the adult males. When the two subgroups re-joined later in the afternoon, an altercation was observed between the two males.
- On the evening of 21 February, the troop was split and slept separate at two nearby sleep sites, with an adult male at each sleep site. The troop re-joined the following morning.
- During the late afternoon of 23 February, while the troop was approaching the sleepsites above Hermanus Heights, a paraglider became visible to the west of the troop. The troop got a fright and ran east and later settled above the Visitor's Centre in Fernkloof Nature Reserve.
- On 24 February an unknown troop was seen at Adderladder in Fernkloof Nature Reserve. On this
 morning the Voëlklip Troop slept above the Visitor's Centre in Fernkloof Nature Reserve. A conflict
 was heard later that morning near the Boekenhoutbos Waterfall, but it was not possible to tell
 whether Voëlklip individuals were involved in the conflict. The distance between the two locations
 suggests that it was probably a conflict between individuals of the unknown troop.
- The troop continued to frequent the farms north of Rotary Way.
- A female, VKF7, was captured and collared on 03 February. She was successfully released with the troop later on the same day.




Figure 2.3: Number of incursions by the Voëlklip Troop and individuals during February 2022.

1.2 VOGELGAT TROOP

1.2.1 IN TOWN STATISTICS

- February is the 18th consecutive month the troop has remained 100% out of town.
- Time out of town for individuals remained at 100% for the sixth consecutive month.

1.2.2 NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- Individuals from the Vogelgat troop continued to enter the properties along the R43. However, no non-urban house incursions were recorded.
- On 8, 15 and 17 February hotline calls reported baboons in the eastern avenues of Voëlklip. HWS staff were unable to find any baboons in the area.

1.2.3 VIRTUAL FENCE

• Use of the virtual fence was not required this month as the troop did not approach the urban space.

1.3 ONRUS TROOP

• The Onrus Troop was not observed on a single occasion during February.

1.4 HAMILTON RUSSEL TROOP

- On 14 February an unidentified troop was spotted on Hamilton Russell Farm. The location suggests that it was the Hamilton Russell Troop.
- On 23 February a male baboon was heard vocalising to the north-east of Hamilton Russell farm. This individual might belong to the Hamilton Russell Farm.

1.5 **BIRTHS, DEATHS & MIGRATIONS**

• No births or migrations were recorded this month

On 01 February HWS staff received a report of a dead baboon on a farm in the Hemel-en-Aarde Valley. The carcass of a young juvenile baboon was located. It was very decomposed and likely multiple weeks old.

OVERSTRAND WEST TROOPS

1.6 PRINGLE BAY TROOP

1.6.1 IN TOWN STATISTICS

- Pringle Bay Troop spent 100% of its time out of town this month, an increase of 0,2% from 99,8% in January.
- Time out of town by Pringle Bay Troop individuals remained low this month at 75,1%.




Figure 3.1: Troop and individual daily (bars) and monthly (area) Time in Town by the Pringle Bay Troop during February 2022.

1.6.2 NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- PBF1 was fitted with a new satellite collar on 2 February. This female was chosen because she had an old half-broken collar that needed to be removed. After she had been sedated, it became apparent that PBF1 was heavily pregnant.
- PBF1 gave birth to an infant, which was first recorded on 7 February. The infant remains in good health.
- The troop used the northern half of their home range extensively over February (Figure 3.4), spending prolonged periods foraging on *Prionium serratum* (River Palmeit) in the Rooiels River.
- Although the number of incursions by PBM2 declined this month, he was still notable for committing 14 occupied house raids, which was almost double that for the whole of the Betty's Bay Troop.
- PBM2 entered the urban area on three separate occasions during February; 6-11 ;19-22; and 23-26, totalling 13 days spent in Pringle Bay. During the periods in which PBM2 was in the urban area, he loosely associated with HKM1, often sleeping in the same area.
- Due to continued aggressive interactions with the dominant males of the Pringle Bay Troop, HKM1 has not integrated successfully and thus spent a large proportion of the month in the urban area. He was observed in Pringle Bay on 25 days in February.
- A new lone male was seen near the troop on 3 February. The origin troop of the dispersing male is unknown. Another lone male seen near troop on 16 February. It is not clear if this was the same male on both occasions.
- BRM1 was identified in the urban area on two occasions during February. The first incursion took
 place on 10-11 February, and the second was on 25-26 February. On both occasions BRM1 was
 observed departing the urban area with PBM2, with both males moving in the direction of Buffelstal
 Nature Reserve.
- The Buffelsrivier Troop was seen interacting antagonistically with the Pringle Bay Troop on two occasions, 13 and 19 February. On both occasions several males from the Buffelsrivier Troop were observed chasing the adult females of the Pringle Bay Troop.
- Another lone male was observed in the urban area with PBM2 on 21 February. He subsequently raided an unsecured bin. This male was observed leaving the urban area with PBM2 on 22 February and re-entering with PBM2 on 23 February. This male was also observed departing the urban area on 26 February and re-entering the same day accompanied by HKM1.




Figure 3.3: Number of incursions for the Pringle Bay Troop and individuals during February 2022.




Figure 3.4: Map showing the GPS locations of PBF1 in the Pringle Bay Troop (red) and HKM3 in the Hangklip troop (cyan) during February 2022.

1.7 HANGKLIP TROOP

1.7.1 IN TOWN STATISTICS

• February is the fifth consecutive month that no time in town was recorded for the Hangklip Troop or individuals.

1.7.2 NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- HKM1 remained in the Pringle Bay area during February, often associating with Pringle Bay Troop members. He has clearly dispersed from the Hangklip Troop however but has not integrated into the Pringle Bay Troop yet.
- The Hangklip Troop utilised its natural home range between Pringle Bay Village and Sea Farm Private Nature reserve. An area of high usage included the southern half of the Hangklip Trail.
- There were no raids recorded for the Hangklip Troop in February.

- The troop spent 99.9% of its time out of town this month.
- Time out of town by individuals increased slightly to 98.1% this month.





Figure 3.5: Troop and individual daily (bars) and monthly (area) Time in Town by the Silversands Troop during February 2022.

1.8.2 NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- Individuals from the Silversands Troop were observed in the urban area on 12 days this month, a slight increase from 11 days during January.
- The Silversands Troop was observed utilizing the natural areas between Brodie Link Nature Reserve and Sea Farm Private Nature Reserve.
- The troop entered the urban area once this month, with eight individuals seen sitting on the roofs of houses in Senecio Circle.
- No assertive incursions were witnessed this month; however, one bin raid was observed.
- One adult male was seen with an injured bottom lip on 15 February.
- Another male was seen on 27 February with a minor injury to his right forelimb, around the shoulder area, causing no impediment to movement.

1.9.1 IN TOWN STATISTICS

- Troop time out of town declined slightly to 90.3% this month.
- Individual baboons time out of town increased to 84.4% compared to 83.7% during January.




Figure 3.8: Troop and individual daily (bars) and monthly (area) Time in Town by the Betty's Bay Troop during February 2022.

1.9.2 NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- The total number of recorded incursions decreased from 163 in January to 138 in February.
- Fruiting trees in the urban space continue to attract baboons. Baboons were frequently found foraging in fruiting trees within the urban space and on multiple occasions were seen returning to the same fruiting trees to forage.
- Baboons continued to forage on bird seed regularly provided by Betty's Bay residents.
- BBM4 ran at HPG staff in the Harold Porter gardens on two occasions this month.
- BBM4 was recorded stealing a lunchbox and a backpack from construction workers this month.
- Picnickers in Harold Porter Gardens were targeted on four occasions this month and baboons managed to obtain food from picnickers on each occasion. BBM2, BBM4 and adult females were involved in these incidents.

- A total of 64 incursions were recorded for BBM2, BBM3 and BBM4, with these individuals participating in 23, 19 and 22 incursions respectively.
- Occupied and unoccupied house incursions almost halved this month, but still eight occupied, and eight unoccupied house incursions were recorded. Individuals often gained access via open doors or windows. Only five bin raids were recorded this month.
- On 14 February a resident along Clarence Drive was observed firing at a baboon with what was believed to be a pellet gun. Residents are reminded that they are not permitted to shoot at baboons with any type of projectile or firearm.
- On 26 February BBM3 and 2 other baboons (an adult female and a juvenile) entered a non-urban property east of Sunny Seas. While the baboon was inside the property two shots were heard by HWS Field Rangers. BBM3 was seen approximately 13 minutes later leaving the property with blood visible on his chest, but otherwise his movement did not seem impaired. Later it was noticed that BBM3 had slowed down and was not keeping up with the troop. A vet was called out to assess the extent of his injuries. BBM3 was anaesthetized and assessed by two vets in the field and then taken to a clinic for X-rays to be taken. After thorough assessments at the veterinary clinic, it was decided euthanasia would be the most humane approach because BBM3 had suffered extensive injuries from gunshot wounds.




Figure 3.10: Number of incursions by the Betty's Bay Troop and individuals during February 2022.

1.10 **BIRTHS, DEATHS & MIGRATIONS**

- One birth was recorded in the Pringle Bay Troop this month.
- One death, BBM3, was recorded this month.
- One new male migration was observed in the western region this month. It is suspected that the male may have come from either the Hangklip or Silversands Troop.

GENERAL COMMENTS – ALL TROOPS

1.11 POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

One birth and two deaths were recorded in the managed population of baboons in the Overstrand area. PBF1 was observed carrying an infant on 7 February in the Pringle Bay Troop. One deceased baboon was reported in the Hemel-en-Aarde Valley. Upon examination it was determined that the animal must have been dead for 1-2 weeks based on the level of decomposition. The origin of the deceased individual is unclear, however given the location, it is assumed that it belonged to the Hamilton-Russel Troop.

Betty's Bay recorded one death during February. On the 26th of February, BBM3 was euthanized after sustaining several gunshot wounds. This is the first death recorded as a result of human induced injuries (HID) in the Betty's Bay Troop since official management on this troop began in April 2021. One dispersing adult male was observed in the Pringle Bay urban area this month. This male was seen associating several times with PBM2 and HKM1. Because this was still a loose association, this male was not regarded as being part of the Pringle Bay Troop and may still be dispersing. The troop of origin of this male was unclear.

1.12 HOTLINE DATA

Incursion related hotline calls decreased this month from 139 to 91. The majority of hotline calls came from Betty's Bay (n=55), with the largest proportion (n=28) or calls originating from the Jock's Bay area of Betty's Bay. This is not unusual, because some of the favourite sleep sites of the Betty's Bay Troop are located in Disa Kloof and Leopard Kloof. As a result, when the troop enters or leaves town via the Harold Porter Gardens they regularly go through Jocks Bay at the beginning or end of each day. It should be noted here that hotline calls are not only physical calls to the HWS phone number, but also include group messages (reporting baboon incursions) between residents which have included the HWS number on their groups.




Figure 4.1: Hotline calls in baboon affected areas for February 2022. Incursion related hotline calls are calls reporting managed baboons in urban areas. Managed areas are those areas in which baboon troops are known to occur and are actively managed. 'Other Areas' represent those areas beyond the urban edge or the range of managed baboons.




Figure 4.2: Composition of incursion-related hotline calls during February 2022. <u>Note</u>: This chart represents the composition of hotline calls, not the composition of known incursions by baboons.

1.13 <u>RECORDED INCURSIONS</u>

During February, a total of 233 incursions were recorded, with the vast majority (89%) as usual being recorded for the Betty's Bay and Pringle Bay Troops. These two troops are the two most habituated troops, as well as being the two which are most fed by residents, either directly or indirectly by providing bird seed or encouraging baboons to feed on fruiting trees in their gardens and preventing HWS from moving them out of their gardens.

It is notable that the troop with the third most incursions was the Silversands Troop. This troop had more than double the number of incursions than the Voëlklip Troop which, for many years, used to be known as the troop most noted for raiding in the urban areas. By contrast, the Silversands Troop is noted for seldom being seen as a troop, but single males are often observed coming into the urban area and are reportedly regularly fed by a few residents in the western side of town. This is a trend that needs to curbed as soon as possible before this troop regresses to the status of the other two managed troops in the Overstrand West.




Figure 4:3: Total observed incursions per troop during February 2022. <u>Note:</u> Observed incursions are not hotline related, but are incursions observed by HWS field staff.

1.14 PERCENTAGE TIME OUT OF TOWN

In February the average time out of town by troops increased to 99.1%, an increase of 0.2% compared to the previous month. Conversely, the percentage time spent in town for individuals decreased, from 95% to 94.1%. As with last month, the increased time spent in town can mainly be attributed to individuals from the Pringle Bay Troop spending prolonged periods in the urban area. These individuals, including the

immigrant male HKM1, spent at least 109 hours in town and were present in Pringle Bay on 25 days during February. The average time spent in town was 4 hours and 45 minutes. Similarly, individuals from the Betty's Bay Troop spent 58 hours and 18 minutes in town over 26 days, with an average time in town of 2 hours and 5 minutes per day.

This is more than enough time for these baboons to meet all their daily nutritional requirements, particularly if they are eating human derived foods (HDF's), which have ten times the energy value of fynbos vegetation (Fehlmann *et al.*, 2017).




Figure 4.4: Percentage time the managed baboon troops and individuals spent out of town during February 2022.

1.15 **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- Waste and recycling collection should be prioritised to take place in the early mornings.
- All bins used in baboon effected areas should be **baboon-proof and locked.**
- Additional **baboon awareness** campaigns focused on tourists during holiday seasons would be beneficial.
- Baboon-proof bins are required throughout the western region of the Overstrand. Betty's Bay should be regarded as a high priority area because there are very few baboons proof bins in place. It is stipulated in the Overstrand Waste Management Bylaw that residents must use baboon proof bins in baboon effected areas.
- **Refuse bags** should not be left lying open on the sidewalk and easily available to baboons.
- Ripening **fruit on fruit trees** in baboon-affected areas should be harvested to remove the attractant for baboons.
- **Open vegetable gardens** should be baboon proofed.

- Residents are encouraged not to feed wildlife, including birds.
- Residents are encouraged to record and report the feeding of wildlife to the municipality, CapeNature, or to the baboon hotline (072 028 0008).

CONCLUSION

The western troops continued to be the cause of most of the human baboon conflict in the Overstrand, with 225 of the 233 recorded incursions (96.6%) being committed by the western troops, and with over half of all incursions being recorded by Betty's Bay Troop alone. It is furthermore notable, that over 93% of all assertive interactions (house raids, threatening people) were recorded by the two most habituated troops, namely the Pringle Bay and Betty's Bay Troops. In this regard, one the two baboons most noted for assertive raids in the Betty's Bay Troop, namely BBM3, was shot and mortally wounded this month, potentially by a resident. It should be noted here that it is illegal to discharge a firearm in an urban area unless in self-defence. What effect the absence of this male will have on the rest of the troop, should become evident over the next few months.

In the eastern Overstrand, the management of the Voëlklip Troop improved even further as individuals were only able to access the urban space on two occasions this month, while the troop again did not access the urban space at all. The troop's movements remained similar to recent months as it continued to visit the vineyards northwest of town and also moved deep into Fernkloof Nature Reserve to forage.

The Vogelgat Troop continued to frequent the eastern parts of its home range, but did approach the Vogelgat river on one occasion. Although hotline calls reported baboons in the eastern avenues of the Voëlklip suburb on several occasions this month, HWS staff could not locate any baboons in the area. On one such occasion, the troop was located near the Vogelgat River the following day. Thus, the individual reported in eastern Voëlklip could either have been a dispersing male or a lone individual from the Vogelgat Troop.

The situation in Pringle Bay has continued to be challenging, with PBM2 maintaining the behaviour he exhibited during previous months. Over the course of February PBM2 made three trips away from the troop in order to obtain Human Derived Foods (HDF's) in the urban area of Pringle Bay. Fortunately, he was unable to recruit any females to join him in town, however he often associated with HKM1 who maintained a strong presence in the urban area due his unsuccessful integration into the Pringle Bay Troop. Whilst HKM1 spent a large proportion of the month in Pringle Bay, he has to date not exhibited the level of assertive behaviour commonly practiced by PBM2, with only one recorded occupied house incursion.

Individuals of the Betty's Bay Troop were, as usual, responsible for the greatest number of incursions this month, having almost double the number of incursions of the Pringle Bay Troop. The Betty's Bay Troop continued regularly to enter the urban area, and as a troop entered Betty's Bay on 19 days during February. Access to fruiting trees in the urban area remained a great attractant to the baboons. On the positive side, however, house incursions and bin raids decreased this month, but individuals from this troop continued to steal food from residents and visitors, especially from picnickers in the Harold Porter Gardens.
