

Human Wildlife Solutions Overstrand Monthly Report January 2023

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INTRODUCTION

This monthly report covers the period from 1 January to 31 January 2022.

In the Eastern Overstrand, there was a significant improvement in the behaviour of the Voëlklip Troop. There was a substantial reduction in the amount of time spent in town, with individuals from the Voëlklip Troop only present in the urban area on one day during January. Only three incursions were recorded by members of the troop. Further east, the Vogelgat Troop itself remained outside the urban area, although a few individuals did manage to enter Voëlklip suburb on two days towards the end of January.

In the Western Overstrand there was a general decline in behaviour, with time out of town for the Betty's Bay Troop and Pringle Bay Troop both decreasing during January. Likewise, the increased time spent in town led to a number of highly assertive behaviours, such as threatening and stealing behaviour, increased in both troops. Additionally, several cases of overt feeding of baboons were observed, with the majority of cases occurring in Pringle Bay. The feeding of baboons is highly detrimental to management efforts and undermines any progress made in encouraging the baboons to remain in their natural habitat.

Further south, on the Hangklip Peninsula, the Hangklip Troop interacted with the Pringle Bay Troop on several occasions during the month. PBM2 was later seen in close association with a female belonging to the Hangklip Troop and after 13 January was no longer seen in Pringle Bay. However, as reported on the baboon hotline, PBM2 continued to enter occupied buildings in the Hangklip area. The potential teaching of this behaviour by PBM2 to the Hangklip Troop is of great concern because it could create another troop that regularly raids human establishments for food. This would undermine the successful management results achieved with the Hangklip Troop over the past 18 months.

In Silversands, the troop did not enter the urban area during January and in general there was an improvement in behaviour by members of the troop. As with previous months, SSM1 continued to be responsible for the majority of the incursions recorded in the Silversands area. It is therefore recommended that SM1 be collared as soon as possible to mitigate potential incursion behaviour.

OVERSTRAND EAST TROOPS

VOËLKLIP TROOP

1.1.1 IN TOWN STATISTICS

- Troop time out of town increased by 1.4% during January, with the troop spending no time in town during the month.
- Time out of town for individuals increased significantly by 11.2% in January.




Figure 1.1 Troop and individual daily time (minutes) in town (bars), and monthly (area) percentage Time in Town by the Voëlklip Troop during January 2023.

 On 16 January two male baboons were reported on Raed-Na-Gael Street at 19h28. When field staff investigated they found no sign of the two baboons.

- Voëlklip Troop was not present in Voëlklip at all during January.




Figure 1.3 Number of incursions for the Voëlklip Troop and individuals during January 2023.

1.1.3 IN TOWN STATISTICS




Figure 2.1 Troop and individual daily time (minutes) in town (bars), and monthly (area) percentage Time in Town by the Vogelgat Troop during January 2023.




Figure 2.3 Number of incursions for the Vogelgat Troop and individuals during January 2023.

1.1.4 NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- Individuals from the Vogelgat Troop entered the urban area on two days during January.
- On the 27 January Human Wildlife Solutions (HWS) received a hotline message reporting a
 dead baboon on the R43. The baboon was reported to be roughly 500 meters from De
 Vette Mossel. Upon arrival the HWS Field Manager could not find the dead baboon but
 found extensive evidence of a baboon being hit by a car. The HWS Field Manager searched
 the surrounding area extensively for the body but was unsuccessful. It is unclear what
 happened to the baboon carcass.

ONRUS TROOP

• There were no observations of the Onrus Troop during December.

HAMILTON RUSSEL TROOP

• Vocalisations from an unknown troop in the vicinity of Ashbourne Dam on 8 January were attributed to the Hamilton-Russel Troop.

BIRTHS, DEATHS & MIGRATIONS

• One death and no births were recorded in the Eastern Overstrand during January.

VIRTUAL FENCE

• In the Eastern Overstrand, the Virtual Fence was activated on six days during January.

OVERSTRAND WEST TROOPS

PRINGLE BAY TROOP

1.1.5 IN TOWN STATISTICS

- The time spent out of town by the Pringle Bay Troop decreased very significantly during January, from 77% in December to 64.7% in January.
- Time out of town by Pringle Bay Troop individuals increased from 73.9% during December to 79.8% in January. It should be noted that this increase is likely a function of the increased time spent in town by the troop.




Figure 3.1 Troop and individual daily time (minutes) in town (bars), and monthly (area) percentage Time in Town by the Pringle Bay Troop during January 2023.

1.1.6 NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- On 13 January PBF5 was observed carrying her deceased infant. The death of the infant
 was not directly observed, but the cause was almost certainly infanticide. HWS staff
 observed a huge fighting commotion occurring in the area behind Lemoenkop on the
 afternoon of 12 January. The following morning the infant was observed dead and it's
 mother, PBF5, had visible injuries on her right hand and left upper forelimb which she most
 probably sustained while trying to protect her infant. It is therefore most likely that the
 infant died as the result of infanticide.
- On 13 January, PBM2 began to associate with a female from the Hangklip Troop whilst the
 two troops were interacting. After 13 January PBM2 remained with the Hangklip Troop.
 He was last seen associating with the Pringle Bay Troop on 21 January when the Pringle
 Bay and Hangklip Troops interacted near the Hangklip Hotel.
- Several instances of feeding by residents were observed during January, including the provisioning of a whole watermelon by a resident of Pringle Bay.
- A resident was observed discharging a paintball marker at several juveniles.
- BTM1 was responsible for five snatching incidents during the month. BTM1 often hid in vegetation close to the CBD in order to access food being carried by residents.




Figure 3.3 Number of incursions for the Pringle Bay Troop and individuals during January 2023.




Figure 5.1 Troop and individual daily time (minutes) in town (bars), and monthly (area) percentage Time in Town by the Silversands Troop during January 2023.




Figure 5.3 Number of incursions by the Silversands Troop and individuals during January 2023.




Figure 6.1 Troop and individual daily time (minutes) in town (bars), and monthly (area) percentage Time in Town by the Betty's Bay Troop during January 2023.

1.1.12 NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- On 7 January the Oudebosch Troop was observed on the plateau north of the Zigzag Trail.
 At the time of this observation, the Betty's Bay Troop was in the burnt trees inside Leopards Kloof.
- Six separate incidents involving snatching or stealing food were recorded during January (two by BBF2 and four by BBM4). The majority of these incidents occurred in Harold Porter Botanical Gardens.




Figure 6.3 Number of incursions by the Betty's Bay Troop and individuals during January 2023.

BIRTHS, DEATHS & MIGRATIONS

- No births were recorded in the Western Overstrand, whilst one death was recorded in Pringle Bay during January.
- One potential migration was recorded, with PBM2 emigrating from the Pringle Bay Troop into the Hangklip Troop.

GENERAL COMMENTS – ALL TROOPS

POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

During January there was a total of two deaths and no births recorded in the managed population of baboons (**Table 7.1**). An infant in Pringle Bay died, almost certain as the result of infanticide, whilst a Vogelgat individual was struck by a motor vehicle (**Table 7.2**). One potential migration was observed in January when PBM2 joined the Hangklip Troop on 13 January after associating closely with a female in the Hangklip Troop. It is possible that this move may be permanent.

HOTLINE DATA




Figure 8.1: Hotline calls in baboon affected areas for January 2023. Incursion related hotline calls are calls reporting managed baboons in urban areas. Managed areas are those areas in which baboon troops are known to occur and are actively managed.




Figure 8.2: Composition of incursion-related hotline calls during January 2023. <u>Note:</u> This chart represents the composition of hotline calls, not the composition of known incursions by baboons.

Incursion related hotline calls in managed areas decreased significantly, from 168 in December to 118 in January. The majority of calls came from Jock's Bay (n = 27), followed by Pringle Bay (n = 19) (**Figure 8.1**). There was a significant reduction in the number of calls regarding the Voëlklip Troop, reflecting their absence from the urban area for the majority of the month. Whilst the majority (82%) of hotline calls were made to alert HWS to the presence of baboons in the urban area (**Figure 8.2**), there was an increase in the number of reports concerning serious assertive behaviour, including Snatching; Breaking & Entering; and Nocturnal incursions.

RECORDED INCURSIONS




Figure 9.1 Total observed incursions per troop during January 2023. <u>Note:</u> Observed incursions are not hotline related, but are incursions observed by HWS Field Staff.

The total number of incursions recorded during the month decreased from 415 during December to 352 in January (**Figure 9.1**) with the Pringle Bay and Betty's Bay Troop responsible for 93% of all incursions. In the Western Overstrand the number of occupied house incursions decreased substantially from 71 in December to 43 in January, with the majority (n =23) occurring in Pringle Bay. Additionally, the number of bin raids decreased marginally from nine to seven during January. Unfortunately, the number of threatening or stealing instances doubled, with 11 snatching instances documented (five in Pringle Bay and six in Betty's Bay). Furthermore, one breaking and entering incident was documented outside of Pringle Bay, involving the Pringle Bay Troop entering the Hangklip Hotel through a window that was broken by one of the Pringle Bay Troop.

PERCENTAGE TIME OUT OF TOWN




Figure 9.2 Percentage time the managed baboon troops and individuals spent out of town during January 2023.

The average time out of town by troops decreased during the month, from 96.2% to 94.3% (**Figure 9.2**), whilst individual time out of town increased from 93.4% in December to 95% in January. The decrease in average time out of town for troops is due to the Pringle Bay Troop spending significantly more of their time in the urban area during the month whilst the increased time out of town for individuals is due primarily to the absence of members of the Voëlklip Troop from the urban area.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Ripening **fruit on fruit trees** in baboon-affected areas should be harvested to remove the attractant for baboons. **This is particularly important now during summer.**
- Waste and recycling collection should be prioritised to take place in the early mornings.
- Residents should not put out their waste the night before collection day.
- All bins used in baboon effected areas should be baboon-proof and locked.
- Baboon-proof bins are required throughout the western region of the Overstrand. Betty's Bay should be regarded as a high priority area because there are very few baboons proof bins in place. It is stipulated in the Overstrand Waste Management Bylaw that residents must use baboon proof bins in baboon effected areas.
- Refuse bags should not be left lying open on the sidewalk and easily available to baboons.
- Open vegetable gardens should be baboon proofed.
- Residents are strongly discouraged from feeding wildlife, including birds.
- Residents are encouraged to record and report the feeding of wildlife to the municipality, CapeNature, or to the baboon hotline (072 028 0008).

CONCLUSION

There were significant improvements in behaviour of the Voëlklip Troop in the Eastern Overstrand after what was a challenging December. During January, the Voëlklip Troop as a whole was entirely absent from the urban area, with individuals from the troop only present in town on one day during the month. The troop instead utilised the mountains above Hermanus Heights, and areas within the Fernkloof Nature Reserve. No assertive incursions by members of the Voëlklip Troop were recorded during January. Further east, the Vogelgat Troop was absent from the urban area for a fourth consecutive month. However, individuals from the troop did enter town on two days at the end of January. Unfortunately, yet another baboon was killed along the R43. This was the sixth baboon from the Vogelgat Troop to have died as the result of being struck by a car since management of this troop began in August 2020. Furthermore, a second baboon, a member of an unmanaged troop near Stanford, was also struck and assumed killed by a motor vehicle in January.

The behaviour of the Pringle Bay and Betty's Bay Troops deteriorated during January, with both troops spending increased amounts of time in the urban area. This trend was most pronounced in Pringle Bay where the troop spent 35.3% of its time inside the urban area during January. Additionally, there was a significant increase in the number of snatching/stealing incidents, almost doubling since December from six to eleven. The occurrence of these incidents was split evenly between Pringle Bay and Betty's Bay. It should be noted that the relative reduction in the number of occupied house incursions by the Pringle Bay Troop (from 44 in December to 23 in January) was likely due to the absence of PBM2 (two occupied house incursions) from the urban area for the majority of the month. PBM2 was observed associating with a female from the Hangklip Troop from 13 January onwards, and was last seen associating with the Pringle Bay Troop on 21 January. It is worth noting that despite being absent from Pringle Bay itself, PBM2 started raiding homes around Hangklip, as reported via several hotline calls.

Sadly, another infant in the Pringle Bay Troop, the offspring of PBF5, died during the month. Whilst the action was not directly observed, the cause of death was almost certainly infanticide. HWS staff observed a huge fighting commotion occurring in the area behind Lemoenkop on the afternoon of 12 January. The following morning the infant was dead and its mother was visibly wounded on her forelimbs. These injuries were most probably sustained while trying to protect her infant. After the death of this infant, the parents of the last remaining infant in the troop, HKM1 and PBF6, foraged and slept separately from the troop for the rest of the month. HWS also seldom observed this trio which clearly seemed to be hiding away from the rest of the troop, particularly the other males (Stoltz & Saayman, 1970). This is the third death by infanticide recorded in this troop over the past year. All of these incidents can be related to the high levels of intra-male conflict in this troop, which has only four adult females and had up to seven adult males at one time. Two of the males died from human induced causes (vehicle accident and poisoning).

On a more positive note, the Silversands Troop saw some improvement in behaviour over the month. The troop did not enter the urban area at all during January, and the amount of time spent in town by individuals also decreased. Furthermore, there were no occupied house incursions recorded although two incidents of unoccupied house raids were documented.
