Monthly Report

August 2023

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INTRODUCTION

This monthly report covers the period from 1 August to 31 August 2023.

The behaviour of both the Voëlklip and Vogelgat Troops improved again from gains made during July. Both troops were entirely absent from the urban area during August, although there were individuals present in the urban area on seven days during the month. Additionally, no bin raids or assertive incursions of any kind were recorded across the eastern Overstrand. The number of hotline calls received also fell by more than 50%, from 22 in July to eight in August.

It should be noted that whilst baboon management by HWS in the Overstrand West was discontinued in July 2023, HWS has continued to receive some hotline calls from previously managed areas. These hotline calls were recorded and are presented in this report.

The other two troops managed in the Overstrand East, the Hamilton-Russel and Onrus Troops were not observed for the second consecutive month.

OVERSTRAND EAST TROOPS

VOËLKLIP TROOP

IN TOWN STATISTICS

- Troop time out of town increased from 99.6% in July to 100% during August
- Time out of town for individuals increased by 1.8% during August, from 97% to 98.8%.




Figure 1 Troop and individual daily time (minutes) in town (bars), and monthly (area) percentage Time in Town by the Voëlklip Troop during August 2023.

NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- The Voëlklip Troop was absent from the urban area during August.
- Individuals from the Voëlklip Troop entered town on five days during July., Individuals did not enter Voëlklip or Fernkloof at all during August, with all incursions recorded in the Hermanus Heights suburb.
- VKF7 was seen with a new born infant 29 August.
- On 30 August, VKF5 managed to enter the urban area briefly before being steered back unto the mountain. It is thought that she was attracted to unsecured refuse that was laid out one day before bin day.
- The troop spent the majority of the month foraging on the mountains north of Hermanus Heights and Fernkloof. The troop was documented as far north as the Hemel-en-Aarde road. This is the furthest north they have been documented. The motivation for this movement is potentially linked to the new growth in the vineyards.




Figure 3 Number of incursions for the Voëlklip Troop and individuals during August 2023.

VOGELGAT TROOP

IN TOWN STATISTICS

- Time out of Town for the Troop remained at 100% during August.
- Time out of town for individuals increased from 99.7% and to 99.8% during August.




Figure 4 Troop and individual daily time (minutes) in town (bars), and monthly (area) percentage Time in Town by the Vogelgat Troop during August 2023.

NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- Three members of the Vogelgat Troop entered town on two days during August. No other incursions were recorded.
- The Vogelgat Troop continued to spend the majority of its time foraging and sleeping on the mountain slopes north of Maanskynbaai and the Hermanus Yacht Club.
- A wild troop was seen on 27 August on the mountains north of Hermanus Yacht Club. The wild troop looks to be comprised of one adult male, four sub-adult males, six females and seven juveniles, with a total population of 18. One female was observed carrying deceased infant.
- During the end of the month, on 27 and 28 August, the Vogelgat Troop and the wild troop were seen foraging very close together, just north of the Hermanus Yacht Club.




Figure 6 Number of incursions for the Vogelgat Troop and individuals during August 2023.

ONRUS TROOP

• There were no observations of the Onrus Troop during August by HWS Staff. Likewise, no hotline calls were received regarding the Onrus Troop.

HAMILTON RUSSEL TROOP

• There were no observations of the Hamilton-Russel Troop during August by HWS staff. No hotline calls regarding the Hamilton-Russel Troop were received.

VIRTUAL FENCE

• In the Eastern Overstrand, the Virtual Fence was activated on two days during August.

GENERAL COMMENTS

POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

One birth was recorded in the Voëlklip Troop during August 2023. On 27 August, VKF7 was observed carrying a newborn infant. No deaths were recorded in any managed troops in the eastern Overstrand during the month. One deceased juvenile was seen being carried by an adult female in the wild troop near Stillwaters.

Table 4: Causes of baboon deaths since October 2019; *Deaths caused directly by humans, such as motor vehicle accidents, shooting, poisoning and dogs. **Deaths caused indirectly by humans such as electrocutions and fire.

HOTLINE DATA

A total of eight hotline calls were received during August (**Table 5**), with five originating in managed areas. Four of the hotline calls were received from the Hermanus Heights area and reported baboons in the urban area. The other call was received from Fernkloof, asking if baboons were in the vicinity. Three hotline calls were received from previously managed areas, with one each from Pringle Bay, Kleinmond, and Silversands.

RECORDED INCURSIONS




Figure 7 Total observed incursions per troop during August 2023. <u>Note:</u> Observed incursions are not hotline related, but are incursions observed by HWS Field Staff.

The total number of incursions recorded during August was 11 (**Figure 7**), with the majority of the incursions attributed to the Voëlklip Troop (n= 7). There was a 50% decrease in the number of incursions compared to July. The presence of baboons in the urban area were the only incursions recorded. Because of this, no pie chart is presented this month.

PERCENTAGE TIME OUT OF TOWN




Figure 8 Percentage time the managed baboon troops and individuals spent out of town during August 2023.

The average percentage time out of town by troops in the eastern Overstrand during August increased from 99.9% to 100%, with all troops absent from town during the month (**Figure 8**). The Hamilton-Russel and Onrus Troops were not observed during August. Individuals from the Voëlklip and Vogelgat troops entered the urban area on seven days during August, with five and two days respectfully.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Waste and recycling collection should be prioritised to take place in the early mornings and start on the edge of town and work inwards.
- Residents should **not** put out their waste **the night before** collection day.
- **Refuse bags** should not be left lying open on the sidewalk and easily available to baboons.
- All bins used in baboon effected areas should be **baboon-proof and locked**.
- **Open vegetable gardens** should be baboon proofed.
- Residents are strongly discouraged from feeding wildlife, including birds. Bird seed is a powerful attractant for baboons.
- Residents are encouraged to record and report the feeding of wildlife to the municipality, CapeNature, or to the baboon hotline (072 028 0008).

CONCLUSION

August saw the continuation of the improvements in baboon troop behaviour observed during July. Neither troop was present in town at all during August, although individuals from both troops were present in town for brief periods across seven days.

Elsewhere in the eastern Overstrand, the Hamilton-Russell and Onrus Troops have not been observed for two months. This is a positive development because during May and June the Onrus Troop was prevented from reaching town on several days that coincided with refuse collection periods. The lack of observations of these troops highlights the effectiveness of timely interventions in preventing the development of raiding behaviour.

Apart from the presence of baboons in town, no other incursion behaviours were recorded during August. This is a significant improvement since June. It should be noted that on 30 August, VKF7 entered the urban area briefly in search of Human Derived Foodstuffs. This female was most probably attracted into town by unsecured refuse that had been left out on the street the day before refuse collection was due. It is most important that residents take full responsibility for the proper management of their refuse in order to maintain the steady gains made in baboon management over the past few years.

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
