Monthly Report

September 2023

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INTRODUCTION

This monthly report covers the period from 1 September to 30 September 2023.

The behaviour of both the Voëlklip and Vogelgat Troops showed slight improvements from the previous month. Both troops were absent from the urban area for the second consecutive month, with individuals from both troops present in town on only three days during September. Furthermore, the total number of incursions recorded decreased from eleven to three. No bin raids or assertive incursions of any kind were recorded across the eastern Overstrand. Lastly, the number of hotline calls received increased marginally, from eight to twelve.

Although baboon management by HWS in the Overstrand West was discontinued in July 2023, HWS has continued to receive some hotline calls from previously managed areas. These hotline calls were recorded and are presented in this report.

The two other troops managed in the Overstrand East, the Hamilton-Russel and Onrus Troops, were not observed for the third consecutive month.

OVERSTRAND EAST TROOPS

VOËLKLIP TROOP

IN TOWN STATISTICS

- Troop time out of town remained at 100% during September.
- Time out of town for individuals increased by 1.1% during September, from 98.8% to 99.9%.

NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- The Voëlklip Troop was absent from the urban area throughout September.
- Individuals from the Voëlklip Troop entered town on just one day during September. A
 hotline call was received informing HWS of an individual on Waboom Road. When HWS
 field staff arrive in Hermanus heights, three unidentified individuals were pushed out of
 the urban area.
- On 22 September HWS was informed of a baboon that was struck by a car along the Hemelen-Aarde Road. After informing the Overstrand Municipality the HWS capture team departed to the site of the accident. Enroute to the site, HWS was informed that a civilian, the Manager at High Season Guest Farm, had picked up the injured baboon and had taken

it to the Hermanus Animal Hospital. The injured animal had sufferred severe head trauma and was subsequently euthanised. The troop from which this individual originated is unknown.




Figure 1. Troop and individual daily time (minutes) in town (bars), and monthly (area) percentage Time in Town by the Voëlklip Troop during September 2023.

- Time out of Town for the Troop remained at 100% during September.
- Time out of town for individuals increased from 99.8% to 99.9% during September.




Figure 3. Troop and individual daily time (minutes) in town (bars), and monthly (area) percentage Time in Town by the Vogelgat Troop during September 2023.

NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- A single adult female was observed in the urban area on 10 September, spending just over 30 minutes in town before being pushed out to the mountains.
- On 17 September a hotline call was received from the Vogelgat Area, near the Petting Zoo along the R43, reporting an injured baboon. After arriving at the location, the HWS capture team observed the wild troop was present, but there was no sign of any injured animal.




Figure 5. Number of incursions for the Vogelgat Troop and individuals during September 2023.

ONRUS TROOP

• There were no direct observations of the Onrus Troop during September by HWS Staff. There was one hotline call, on 18 September, that reported baboon activity in the vicinity of the cemetery along the R43. This is within the estimated Onrus Troop range. When HWS field staff arrived at the location, there was no sign of the reported baboons.

HAMILTON RUSSEL TROOP

• On 7 September, vocalisations from the Hamilton-Russel Troop were heard originating from the western side of the Boekenhoutbos Waterfall. No other evidence of this troop was recorded during September.

VIRTUAL FENCE

• In the Eastern Overstrand, the Virtual Fence was activated on four days during September.

GENERAL COMMENTS

POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

No births or deaths were recorded in the managed troops in the Eastern Overstrand during September. One baboon died after being hit by a motor vehicle on 22 September. The location of the incident is outside the known ranges for either the Onrus or Hamilton-Russel Troops. There were no migrations recorded during September.

Table 4. Causes of baboon deaths since October 2019; *Deaths caused directly by humans, such as motor vehicle accidents, shooting, poisoning and dogs. **Deaths caused indirectly by humans such as electrocutions and fire.

HOTLINE DATA

A total of twelve hotline calls were received during September (**Table 5**), seven of which originated in managed areas. Three of the hotline calls were received from the Hermanus Heights area, two of which reported baboons in the urban area. The other calls were classed as enquiries and comments on the presence of baboons outside the urban area. Five hotline calls were received concerning unmanaged troops; Hemel en Aarde, Betty's Bay, Kleinmond, Vogelgat, and Silversands. Please note that the call received from the Vogelgat area concerned a potential injury to a member of the wild troop the lives near Stanford.

RECORDED INCURSIONS




Figure 7. Total observed incursions per troop during September 2023. <u>Note:</u> Observed incursions are not hotline related, but are incursions observed by HWS Field Staff.

There were three incursions recorded during September (**Figure 7**). This was a significant decrease from the eleven recorded during August. Furthermore, these three incursions were all just incidents of individual baboons being in the urban area. Because of this no pie chart is presented this month.

PERCENTAGE TIME OUT OF TOWN




Figure 8. Percentage time the managed baboon troops and individuals spent out of town during September 2023.

The average time out of town by troops in the eastern Overstrand during September remained at 100% (**Figure 8**). This marks the second consecutive month in which both troops have been entirely absent from town. The Hamilton-Russel and Onrus Troops continued to be absent from the urban area, and neither troop was observed during September. Individuals from the Voëlklip and Vogelgat troops entered the urban area on three days during September, one and two days respectively.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Waste and recycling collection should be prioritised to take place in the early mornings and starting on the edge of town and working inwards.
- Residents should **not** put out their waste **the night before** collection day.
- **Refuse bags** should not be left lying open on the sidewalk and easily available to baboons.
- All bins used in baboon effected areas should be **baboon-proof and locked**.
- **Open vegetable gardens** should be baboon proofed.
- Ripening fruits should be removed from fruiting trees.
- Residents are strongly discouraged from feeding wildlife, including birds. Bird seed is a powerful attractant for baboons.
- Residents are encouraged to record and report the feeding of wildlife to the municipality, CapeNature, or to the baboon hotline (072 028 0008).

CONCLUSION

During September, residents of the Eastern Overstrand experienced a month of very little baboon activity. All four managed troops were absent from the urban area, and only three brief incidents of individuals in town were recorded. These individuals from the Voëlklip and Vogelgat Troops, spent a combined total of only one hour in town over the course of the month. No other incursions of any kind were recorded.

Beyond the urban edge, two injuries to baboons were reported. One baboon, in the Hemel en Aarde Valley, died after being hit by a motor vehicle. Another baboon was apparently injured on the R43 near the petting zoo. Both injuries were to baboons belonging to wild and unmanaged troops. It should be noted that the injury reported near the petting zoo was not corroborated by HWS field staff, because they did not manage to locate any injured baboon when they arrived at the location.
